MACON POLICE DEPARTMENT

All police officers participated in semi-annual firearms training and qualifications in early June at the Police Department's Firearms Range, instructed by Chief Dawdy.

Our department has received the following items from recent grant awards, which will soon be deployed for field use: Stop Stick equipment for traffic management awarded by Gabrielson's Towing community grant (\$1,000), two MoSWIN portable radios awarded by Local Law Enforcement Block Grant valued at just over \$10,000 and a combination of one in-car video and 5 body-worn cameras made possible by a grant from MIRMA.

In regard to grant awards, we were also notified recently of being awarded an additional \$4,000 from Missouri Department of Highway Safety for overtime wages to conduct Hazardous Moving Violations enforcement and \$4,000 in overtime wages to conduct DWI enforcement for the period of October 1, 2021 - September 30, 2022. All of these grants were written in-house by department staff.

BE AWARE!

Chief Dawdy would like to share with the community we have received a large number of reports concerning potential scam callers to local residents. These scams have varied but include calls allegedly from "Social Security Administration" telling folks their social security number has been used in criminal activities and warrants will be issued if they don't send money. Other citizens have reported being told they have won a large amount of sweepstakes money, but they first needed to send payment to cover taxes, etc. Also, there have been several "Microsoft" technicians calling to report "problems" on home computers which have been attempts to access citizens computers via the internet with intent to steal their identity and cause damage to their computer systems.

There have also been other variations of scam calls and emails as well. In every situation of receiving an unsolicited call or communication, citizens should avoid providing personal identifiers, banking information or other sensitive details to people they don't know. If in doubt, contact your local law enforcement for further assistance. Chief Dawdy states, "Generally, the calls being reported are from citizens who are well aware the type of call they received was a scam or phishing attempt, which is good news in most cases. Letting us know they received a scam call or email allows us to educate other citizens, too."

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Every year, about 10,000 people are treated for injuries in hospital emergency departments due to the mishandling of live, misfired and waste consumer fireworks. In addition, fires resulting from fireworks cause over \$100 million in direct property damage. We recommend leaving fireworks to the professionals, but if you are going to light fireworks here are some tips to keep in mind for the holiday:

- Be aware of your surroundings – keep exits accessible and free of debris.
- Know emergency procedures.
- Note the location of fire extinguisher and how to operate.
- Always keep fireworks in view.
- Dispose of fireworks properly.
- Remove loose powder quickly.
- Do not smoke around fireworks (at least 50ft away.)

Tips for using the grill:

- Only use your grill outside, and keep at least 3 feet from siding, deck rails, and eaves.
- Keep a 3 foot safe zone around the grill to keep kids and pets safe.
- Open your gas grill before lighting.
- Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit, or patio torches. Don't walk away from them when they are lit.
- Clean your grill after each use. This will remove grease that can start a fire.
- Place the coals from your grill in a metal can with a lid once it has cooled.

They installed a new drain tube to help improve storm water issues that have been going on for several years. The Street Department will also be working throughout the month of July and some of August on the street repair projects ahead of the overlay project. Superintendent David states, "We would like to ask citizens for patience as we will have to inconvenience them from time to time and to please drive slow through our work zones."

PUBLIC GROUNDS
